DEVELOPMENT PLATFORM SUPPORTS SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

The Rustenburg Community Development Trust (RCDT) launched a free community Wi-Fi development platform which was at Mfidikwe Primary School on 7 November. It has opened up a wealth of sustainable development opportunities to the community, including information for learners, teachers and community members living within a 5km radius of the school, with plans to expand its reach in the next phase.

The community WiFi development platform and network is a community asset for development. This development platform enables residents to access a wide range of development resources on the portal including health information, educational curricula support and available employment opportunities.

The project, which will modernise both the teaching and learning methods, and support improved learner performance in at least 10 local schools, was made possible through a partnership between RCDT and Anglo American Platinum.

Wi-Fi service providers for the project, E-mbizo Solutions chief executive officer (CEO) Thabo Malebadi said the successful rollout of the project was an example of what communities can achieve if they work together.

Platinum's head of corporate affairs Seara Mkhabela urged learners at the school to embrace modern methods of learning. "I believe in education. The quality of education is influenced by teachers and the learning methods implemented at schools. We must keep ahead of 21st century learning strategies and embrace technology – it's the future. Mfidikwe Primary School headmaster Molefe Modise assured the RCDT and Platinum that the digital technology infrastructure installed at the school is in safe hands and will be kept under lock and key.

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
