Equipping Tlaseng Clinic

Tlaseng clinic is better equipped to provide primary healthcare services after Rustenburg Community Development Trust (RCCTD) donated a substantial amount of medical equipment to the clinic.

RCCTD chairperson Nthabiseng Matsobane and operations manager Katleho Thinane handed over wheelchairs, patient beds, trolleys, scales, stethoscopes, blood pressure monitors, thermometers, steriliser, a Covid-19 vaccine cooler box and more to Tlaseng Clinic on Thursday, 4 November. The clinic is open 7 days a week from 7am to 7pm and provides primary healthcare services to its community, playing an important role in the fight against Covid-19.

"We are now better equipped to serve our community," says Tlaseng Clinic operational manager Batseba Maseko. "The Covid-19 pandemic is truly challenging. Our frontline

workers work tirelessly and need all the support they can get. We are grateful to RCCTD for rising to the occasion ever since the pandemic began," she added.
